Another hard haying year at the Marsh

It has been a couple of tough years haying for the ranchers who utilize the marsh just west of Dundurn.

In the prime time of cutting, the hay is not very tall, and in some areas, it's dead and gone. Ask Larry Pryor how many bales the ranchers cut last year; his answer "Off of 240 acre's, we got 228 bales." Divide this number by three with Larry receiving 76 round bales; forcing him to purchase from other farmers in the

area to feed his cattle. This is a far cry from the 1500 bales they would normally get off the marsh.

The lack of hay is due to SK Water Security flooding out the marsh in 2016. SK Water Security does flood the marsh intermittently through the year from June to October, but last year it was during the second flood that the water did not recede nor drain off - Hence, killing off the plant.

This year, Larry is working with Josiah Wollman cutting

hay. Josiah said, "Even now the hay isn't very good. In prior years the hay was tall and lush and you could get a full round bail in 50 feet."

It's a different story this year, as growth is the same as 2016 in some areas.

When asked about the future of the marsh, both ranchers just look around, not seeming very optimistic.

Shared Vision! - Timber Lodge comes to Life

The Timber Lodge is a community outdoor learning space that will provide sustainable education by linking nature, community and culture.

The Vision Team led by four Dundurn Teachers (Bridget Shannon-Wobeser, Lynne Peters, Cindy Krueger and Rochelle Fiedelleck) planned, presented and announced their dream in the fall of 2016. ** In addition to the grants received, the remaining funding was made possible through the above and beyond generous donations of project design and engineering, materials and equipment, and volunteers' time and labor.**

"We strive to provide our students of Dundurn Elementary School with the opportunity to discover their place in the world via an outdoor learning environment. This space will consist of an octagonal timber structure linked to First Nations Tipi pedagogy. The eight posts will each have a symbolic meaning. Shrubs and trees will be planted around the structure to create pockets of wilderness for extended learning spaces and exploration. Components of curriculum will be connected across all grades levels and all content levels so learning can take place where it most makes sense. Why learn about plants indoors when you can get your hands dirty via authentic and meaningful experiences outdoors? Through this project we know we can

provide students and community members the opportunity to develop a personal awareness, to build respect for the natural world and to become effective lifelong learners by:

- Connecting nature, culture, community
- Working together to preserve community and create a sense of heritage
- Protecting and valuing the environment and place
- Learning and developing a deeper understanding of First Nation and Metis cultures
- Learning new skills, sharing personal feelings and values
- Obtaining mutual trust by recognizing and respecting the values and opinions of others
- Fostering a sense of personal responsibility and character
- Acquiring a sense of the self as part of a larger whole, both in a community and in the natural world "

The dream turned into a reality when it was shared with three remarkable community members who believed in the vision and had a desire to join the journey to create change.

Special thanks to our Community Project Leaders and their families for their time, equipment, and expertise: Sean Hopkins of Alan Auld, Aaron Bohrsen of Allan Construction, and

Kaleb Freeden of BRP Mobile Services. Aaron, Sean and Kaleb were powerhouses in the creation of the T-L. Each played a pivotal role in aligning the three major components of the project. Sean Hopkins, alongside Neil Middleton and Tuan Pham, designed, drafted and stamp engineered the T-L with enthusiasm and insight.

Construction phase was handled by Aaron Bohrsen, with his expertise, inspiration and careful attention to detail. Kaleb Freeden completed the circle with his landscaping skills, extensive knowledge, and a drive to create our pockets of wilderness.

To date, the Timber Lodge and planted Pockets of Wilderness has been achieved through substantial donations of project design and engineering, materials and equipment, donation of time and labor as well as grants received. The Project Team spent 10 months researching, applying, and advocating for their mission. After many collaborative meetings, shovels hit the dirt on May 5th marking it as the official start date. The Timber Lodge will be completed in the fall of 2017.

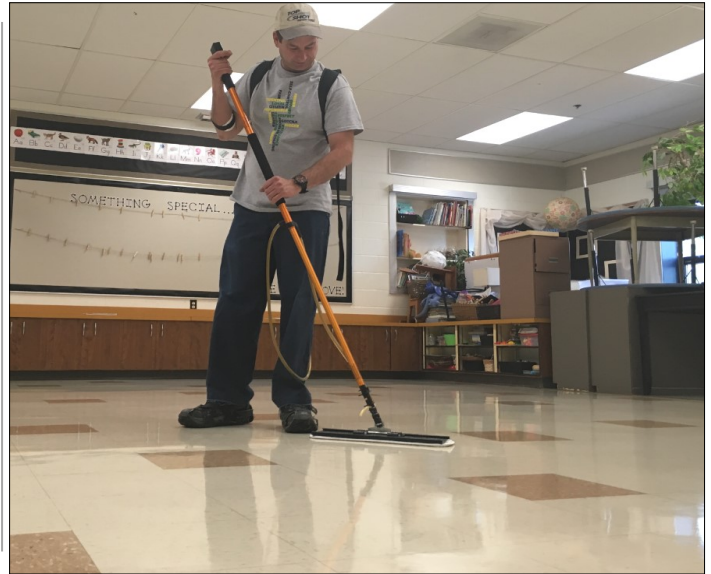

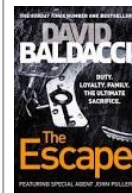
Wet

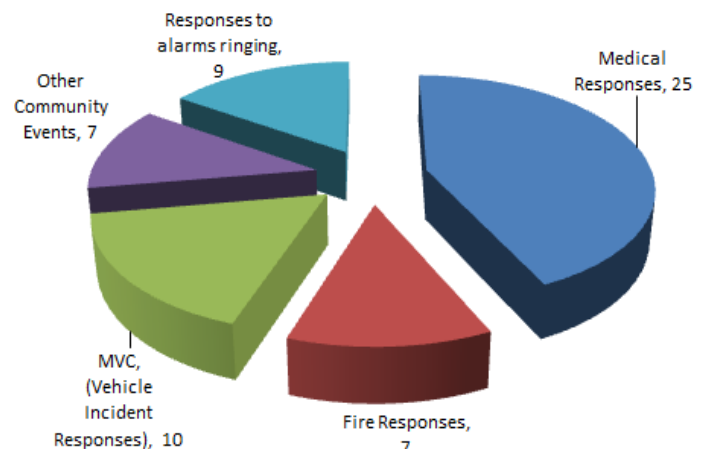

Happy summer!

I really enjoyed my day trip to Dundurn back on June 19, chatting with some of you, delivering a new flag to the Fire Station, watching cattle branding south of town, visiting the new housing development, and discussing flooding issues with some

concerned producers and Environment Minister Scott Moe.

I'd like to share some positive signs of strength and resiliency in Saskatchewan's economy, which include:

- #1 in Canada for new car sales growth;
- Strong building permit growth of 20% over last year;
- Wholesale trade up 13%, the 2nd fastest pace in the nation; and
- Merchandise exports up over 38%, the 3rd highest growth in Canada.

Our government has taken steps to improve Saskatchewan's competitiveness, including a move away from taxes on income, growth and productivity. While encouraging people to invest and earn, this shift also creates a more reliable stream of revenue for a province that has long relied on volatile resource revenues. When our plan is fully implemented, Saskatchewan will have the lowest corporate tax rate and the lowest taxes on manufacturing and processing in all of Canada. Notably, Saskatchewan will have among the lowest income taxes in the country and we will continue to have the lowest Provincial Sales Tax of any province with a PST.

We will also be the only province in Canada without a carbon tax of any kind, and every level of income will still pay significantly less in income tax and Provincial Sales Tax than they did a decade ago. Our government has been clear about how our competitiveness is put at risk by the federal government's plan to impose a carbon tax on our province and its people.

Thousands of Saskatchewan people earn a living in energy, mining and agriculture – trade-exposed, carbon intensive Industries that are especially vulnerable to a carbon tax. The federal government's own working group on carbon pricing acknowledges that a carbon tax would put energy, mining and agriculture sectors at a competitive disadvantage. Economists call this concept "carbon leakage", something that occurs when jurisdictions with a carbon tax lose investment and jobs to jurisdictions without a carbon tax.

Ottawa's plan does not recognize a province's unique contribution to fighting climate change. Nor does it recognize competitive challenges with trade-exposed and carbon intensive industries. Interestingly, a new poll has found that 71 per cent of Saskatchewan people and a strong majority of Canadians are opposed to Ottawa's carbon tax scheme. As a strong and growing majority of people oppose Ottawa's carbon tax and a strong and growing majority are asking their government to continue fighting it. And we will.

Town Office Update - Dundurn's Operating Budget Passed

The 2017 Operating Budget & 10-year Capital Plan has been approved.

The mill rate for 2017 property tax was lowered from 12.90 mills to 10.00 mills.

Minimum tax for Residential land \$550.00.

Minimum tax for Residential improvements was lowered from \$1,252.00 to \$1,100.00.

Minimum tax for Commercial and Agri land increased to \$1,000.00 from \$803.00.

Due to 2017 being a Revaluation year and the higher assessment of properties, the mill rate was reduced 29% to compensate. Minimum tax on land was increased to stimulate the inventory of empty lots within established areas. Some previously undervalued properties realized assessment increases of \$80,000 to \$120,000 which in turn resulted in large tax increases. Overall, the average property tax increased \$100.00. Each year the town receives Municipal Revenue Sharing Funding and for the 2017-2018 period our funding was reduced by

\$29,029.00, which is a significant loss to our budget. This years increase helped to minimize the Revenue Sharing shortfall. Salary/wage increases were also frozen for the 2017 period.

You may have noticed the new weight scale at the dump. The RM has moved to a new weigh and pay system that started July 1. This does not affect Town residents; our dumping rates are still in effect until further notice.

The Community Hall will be getting some much-needed renovations to the washrooms as well as some more closet space for Town/RM storage upstairs. The Hall Committee will also invest in some new round tables that can be easily stored.

The field at the end of Third Ave S will be closed effective immediately.

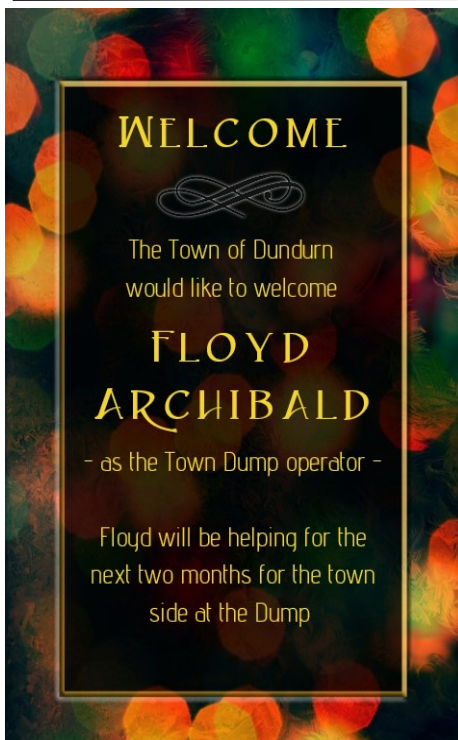

Please keep in mind that the fields surrounding the town limits are privately owned. You must obtain permission to ride your recreational toys on them or else you are trespassing.

Our Bylaw Officer will be monitoring quads and dirt bikes driving around town roads and alleys as we have received many complaints. Also keep in mind that our Bylaw Officer is not here full time. If you experience people speeding or are having issues with quads or dirt bikes, please also call the RCMP and file a complaint.

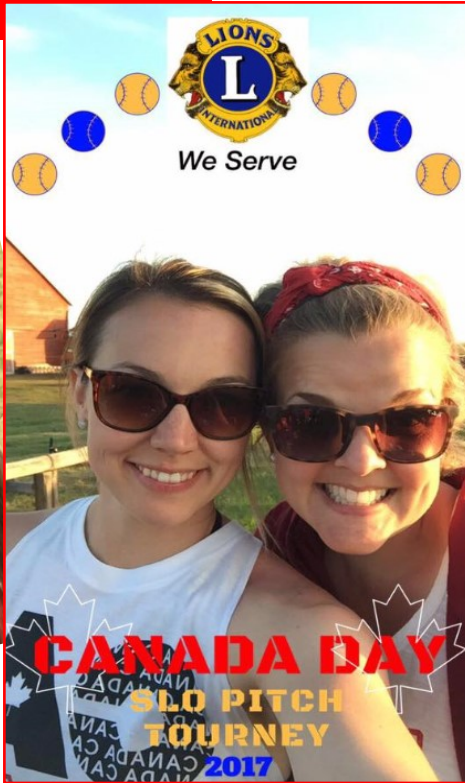

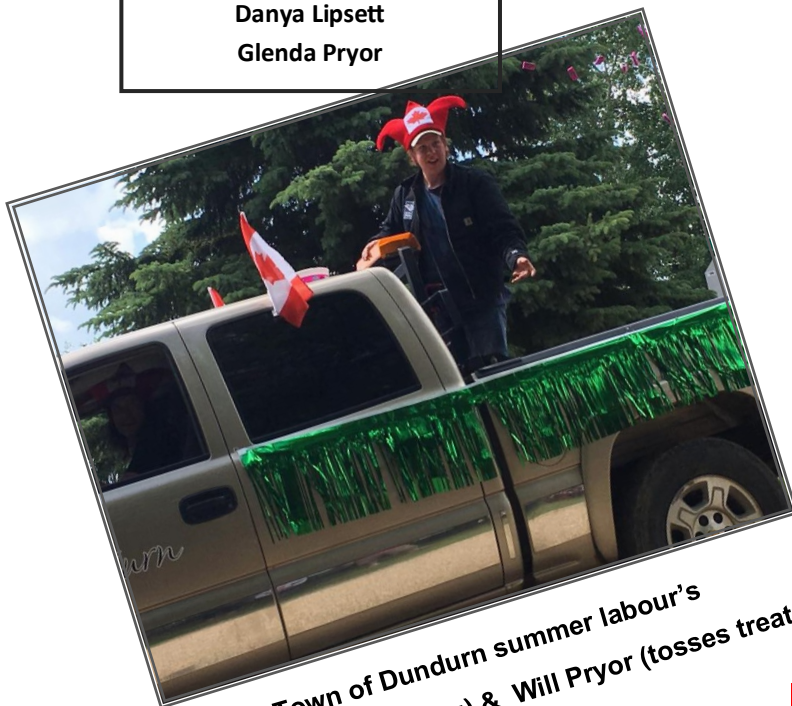

MP Report - Tom Lukiwski



While Canadians may be enjoying the hot weather this summer, there's a hot topic across the nation that

Canadians have made clear they are not enjoying: the Trudeau government's settlement with Omar Khadr.

I hardly need to review the facts of the case as they have been the subject of daily news reports, editorial columns and open-line shows.

While Omar Khadr himself was only a teenager at the time, his family had a long history of involvement in funding, aiding and abetting terrorists. They were technically Canadian citizens but their actions demonstrated that they were "citizens of convenience" who had abused the safety and generosity of Canadian society as a staging ground for their heinous acts. In many statements made by his parents, it is clear that Omar Khadr had been raised to hate Western society and was being groomed to be a killing machine.

After being caught red-handed killing American soldier Sgt. Christopher Speer in Afghanistan, Khadr was imprisoned by the Americans at Guantanamo Bay. While some may debate the treatment he received there, what is not in dispute is that the Khadr family – including Omar – were bent on finding any opportunity they could to attack American and Canadian soldiers.

Under the Harper government, he was ultimately repatriated to Canada. But, not satisfied with having secured his freedom, he sued the federal government for \$20 million.

The Harper government did the right thing by taking the attitude that terrorism should not be rewarded and that this case should be fought at all costs all the way to the Supreme Court if necessary.

The Trudeau government, on the other hand, has been soft on terrorism from the beginning. A law passed by the Conservative government to revoke the citizenship of anyone

convicted of terrorism was subsequently revoked by the Liberals.

The Khadr settlement is further proof of the Liberal's soft-on-terrorism attitude. Bad enough that they caved into Khadr's lawyers. But to make matters worse, they committed the cowardly act of cutting him his cheque in secret before the settlement was formally announced, thereby making it more difficult for Sgt. Speer's widow to counter-sue.

This is a slap in the face to all the brave Canadian and American soldiers who fought to free Afghanistan from the cruel Taliban dictatorship and to guard people around the world from the Taliban's terrorist breeding ground.

This is quite simply a disgrace. It's an insult to Canadian values. Don't let them get away with it. Get in touch with our Minister of Public Security Ralph Goodale and let him know that you do not support the Khadr settlement.

It's time to stand up for what is right.

Canadians from coast to coast are outraged about the Liberal's settlement with Omar Khadr, with good reason. The \$10.5 million payday for this convicted terrorist is a slap in the face to our brave soldiers and their families who risked and sacrificed so much to liberate the Afghan people and to protect the world from terrorist threats.

The Liberals do not have a leg to stand on in this case. With each passing day, the Liberals trot out another excuse. First, they tried to blame the Americans. Then they tried to blame the previous federal government. Then last week Prime Minister Trudeau said the settlement was done to save money, pulling a number out of the air that the courts might have ordered a \$30-40 million settlement despite no reasonable legal standard to support such as guess.

The Liberals are fishing around for someone to blame but they can't get around a key aspect of the case. Why did they sneak the payment to Khadr early, in dead-on-night secrecy before the settlement had been formally announced – a move clearly aimed at thwarting the legal efforts of the widow of the American soldier killed by Khadr?

For all of Justin Trudeau's hollow words about running an open and transparent government, the settlement to Khadr was anything but.

Canadians need to take a stand against the Liberals' soft-on-terrorism approach. I encourage everyone to write, email, phone and protest to Ralph Goodale to drive home the message that enough is enough.
