Just ask Georgia Bayer, she was introduced to Pilates while residing in Africa 9-years-ago. She found that Pilates was the ideal form of exercise that she was looking for and her passion for the exercise led her to become a certified instructor and teach Pilates while living in Namibia, South Africa.

When the Bayer family moved back to Thode Townsite in 2014, she took a break from Pilates and decided to change her career path from Pilates and spinning indoor cycling instructor to an administrative assistant. She received her second certification as a Pilates, Spinning Indoor Cycling, and Yoga instructor in May of 2016 in Saskatchewan and started teaching again at 17 Wing - Det Dundurn gym, where she also works as the Administrative Assistant for CAF Central Saskatchewan.

Georgia teaches her own version of Pilates by incorporating the methods she was taught in Cape Town South Africa, with the North American version. She explains that Pilates and Yoga are different as people get the two confused. "Yoga is more about balance and flexibility, where Pilates focuses on strengthening weaker muscles and correcting body imbalances, as well as, improving posture in all aspects of life including sports, injury rehabilitation, and the ailments that come with aging." Georgia also likes to keep her classes small with eight people being the ideal number; as this allows for a more personalized workout.

Every so often, you've like heard someone ask, "Where did the

money go?" The answer is simple and worth repeating. It was invested in what matters to Saskatchewan people – debt repayment, tax relief, infrastructure improvements, better care and a brighter future.

The operating debt of the province of Saskatchewan has been reduced by over \$1 billion, resulting in \$1 billion in interest payment savings. Tax reductions have saved residents nearly \$6 billion, and over 112,000 low-income individuals in Saskatchewan no longer pay any provincial income tax.

Nearly \$20 billion has been invested in infrastructure. 12,000 kms of road have been repaired and rebuilt across the province. There are 15 new long-term care homes in Saskatchewan, with new hospi-

tals for Moose Jaw and North Battleford. And finally, a Saskatchewan Children's Hospital is being built in Saskatoon.

The money went to 40 new or replacement schools in growing communities with repairs and renovations occurring at more than half of all schools in the province; to pay for 800 new teaching positions, 750 more doctors, and more than 3,000 additional nurses of every designation; to double funding for the Saskatchewan Cancer Agency; and toward a surgical wait time initiative that has taken our wait times from the longest in the country to among the shortest.

The money was used to double funding for people with disabilities, triple the funding for child and family programs, and to add 6,000 new child care spaces; it went to our kids and future leaders by doubling funding for K-12 education and investing nearly \$8.3 billion in postsecondary education.

When Dwayne Williams was appointed building inspector for the RM of Dundurn at the beginning of 2017, it was a role that he slipped into comfortably. Not only because of his 25 years of experience as an inspector, as he has his Level II Provincial Licence and is a Canadian certified building official, but also as he periodically for the past 10 years filled in as acting inspector for his predecessor Al Hiebert.

But his work doesn't end when he returns home from his day job, as he works in the evening out of his home for the RM at his dining room table. When he observes an indiscretion with the building plan, he sends it back for revision; he then starts the process all over again. Once Dwayne has signed off on the plan, only then can the builder start to build.

We knew we had something spectacular when Prof. Janet McVittie, Department of Educational Foundations from the University of Saskatchewan, contacted us requesting a tour of the Outdoor Learning Space and Timber Lodge. Janet and her colleagues were keen to walk the grounds and hear our vision as her passion, teaching and doings aligned with ours. Janet has worked with the U of S and secured funding to create a Prairie Habitat Garden adjacent to the College of Education. The spark started last fall when Janet McVittie, Bridget Shannon-Wobeser and Rochelle Fiedelleck had conversations around lifelong learning; how to connect students to nature and place in a meaningful way. From there it grew into a partnership. They began visiting each other's learning spaces, sharing resources and inspiring each other to look past the walls of traditional settings of education.

If you haven't had a chance to see what all the hype is about, take a stroll to Dundurn Elementary School. Once on the playground site, it's hard to miss the hoopla around a turning point on the Dayson determined and the completion of the TL bodge and Neil Middleton (Ala

that will change the face of learing. One can immediately envision a place where kids have the freedom to experience backyard prairie play with a wilderness feel, where families enjoy a place to meet, and maybe have a picnic as kids climb, explore and create. Now look beyond that and imagine yourself walking or biking on a meditation path which hugs the school yard. It meanders in and out of trees, secret learning coves, a Tipi, the community garden, and an early childhood learning center equipped with a boat. Ahoy Matey? Yes, you heard right!

These purposeful areas, even boats, allow children endless opportunities to gain various skill in the most natural and optimal ways. Children absorb and expand their imagination, connect background information, question, activate kinesthetic sense, evaluate risk and find space to take a moment to slow down. On the corner of 1st Ave & 2nd Street, sits the former Dundurn Bank which has now been renovated as a home. Seaching through a box of archived newspapers at the Dundurn Library, Val the Librarian found an article from the Star Phoenix about the Western Development Museum which was about the Northern Crown Bank in Dundurn.

Below is an exert from the article:

"A businessman in the neighboring community of Dundurn bought the old bank building and was about to remodel it into an office for himself. He planned to "gut" the place, throwing all the old furnishings into the scrap heap.

But a change of heart caused him to call the museum to see if the people there would be interested in salvaging the old equipment.

Museum people were delighted when they saw the oak partitions with their carved rosette designs, the oak counters, brass grillwork and the etched glass that helped give the manager the necessary privacy in his corner office.

The green burlap on the

lower part of the walls, popular in homes and offices of 50 years and more ago, was still in almost mint condition.

Now the partitions, counters, cages, burlap and everything have been put in place in the museum bank. The building is slightly smaller than the one in Dundurn but museum workmen have done a masterful job of making things fit. Walls have also been repainted to make the place as near a replica of the Dundurn bank as possible." - \$19.00 Cheque issued Nov 10, 1911

## The Start of Borealis Circuit - Home Routes Concert Series in RM of Dundurn

Live music is the best music, especially when the listener and artist occupy the same limited space. This is the concept behind the Home Routes concert series. From its base in Winnipeg, Home Routes sends musicians across the country and into the homes of people who host intimate concerts for the local community. 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## **MAYOR PER VINDING**

#### Hi folks,

Some updates from our recent meetings. The town is reviewing the transfer station scale, weigh and pay system with the RM to see if it is suitable for implementation with the town residents.

We approved a new tax incentive bylaw for new residential infill lots and commercial development for established areas. See the office for more details if you are interested in building.

The Rink Committee will be opening the rink by October 1, which is a few weeks early this year. There are 2 initiation teams this year (2 Atom, 2 Novice, 1 Pee Wee) in the Dundurn Minor Hockey League and it looks like premium ice times will be booked solid again this year.

The Lions Club is sponsoring a Dundurn Daze event Sept. 9. The 200 & 300 block of Second Street will be closed from noon – 5 pm for games and a Show & Shine. There are further activities planned at the Lions Grounds as well. Hopefully you can all make it out.

As you may or may not know, the Town's 1 ton truck was stolen from Dundurn on July 26. To date the truck has not been recovered. We are currently in negotiations with SGI regarding the settlement and will need to replace the unit.

We have had some comments from ratepayers questioning why their taxes are paying for pavement on

Government Rd and for infrastructure in the new development. Please note that the developer has paid for all costs associated with Sunshine Meadows. Any items where the Town may share in costs, such as paving Government Rd, were paid for with the development lot fees collected by the town from the developer. The levy on each new lot within the new development is kept aside and is used for the development. The developer will also maintain the development until the phases are 80% complete. Maintenance includes snow removal, grading, landscaping maintenance etc.

With another year of gardening coming to a close, I met with Loraas Waste Management to discuss a new Green Cart Organics program they test marketed this year with a few other municipalities. These carts would take all our household plant and vegetable waste during May to Oct. It's a great option to divert these organics from the dump or a good option for people who don't own a truck or trailer to haul these items. There would be a fee for the biweekly pick up and there is a minimum of 150 residents required to be signed up for the service. The town will be sending out further information and evaluating the interest in the program for the 2018 season.

I attended the Mayor's School in Regina and there were 44 Mayors in attendance. It was an interesting time of discussing with other Mayors the issues common to urban municipalities. There was an interesting

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workshop on the relationship between Council and Administration presented by Municipal Affairs and other workshops including "Strategic Thinking", "Decision Making", "Mind-Mapping" and "Best Practises in an Emergency." The City Manager from Prince Albert presented a very enlightening presentation on what his city went through during their water crisis last year.

Gale Hagblom held an information night August 9, regarding the Town's new Community Plan and Zoning Bylaw. We were a small group but had some very good discussion of items that were meaningful to several residents. Some topics included the short deceleration lane into Dundurn, what to do about the many empty lots in the residential and commercial zoned areas; and what Council can do about unkempt properties with houses and old buildings in need of paint or new siding.

We also would like to welcome Glenn Robbie as the new Public Works Operator. Glenn brings many skills and attributes to the town and we look forward to working with him.

I'd like to give thanks to our summer students, Will Pryor and Zac MacDonald. They did a great job over the summer, the town looked great. We wish them well in their studies for the new school year.
