#### RM OF DUNDURN FACES 2018 PACKED WITH ISSUES

The RM of Dundurn Ratepayers voiced their concerns on Tuesday, January 16<sup>th</sup> during the RM's AGM meeting at the Dundurn Community Hall. Attendance was high as this is the first AGM meeting in conjunction with a Ratepayer's meeting in approximately 8 years. The Ratepayers had vital questions they wanted answered during the open forum portion of the meeting.

Don Ewart chaired the meeting and commented that after the presentation of the agenda items, they would facilitate adequate time for questions during the open forum. The Reeve provided a brief summary that introduced agenda items: the municipal census growth, unionization of the RM Staff, future growth of residential and commercial development in the RM, the recreation complex, the military road, the scale and rates at the transfer station, Canada Post's distribution of mail in the sub-divisions, Dundurn area waste water utility, and APAS.

The open forum began with Ratepayers voicing concerns such as: the recreational complex study, the proposed fire hall, high tax increases, poor road maintenance, foreman staffing, road and vehicle tenders, inadequate details provided in the Council's minutes, development of an effective website and several conflict of issue items. In addition to these concerns, Ratepayers expressed worry about community segregation.


Folks who stood up to the mic sent a clear message to Council of their concerns. Some said that a recreational complex and fire hall located in the RM was unjustified as both facilities are currently located in the Town that serves all four communities. The RM has currently spent \$60,000 on the complex study, and projects the complex to be constructed in phases with an estimated cost between 7 to 12 million dollars. Some concerns

made, were the potential to divide the communities of the RM and the Town. The Reeve suggested a vote at the end of the meeting to progress with the study or abandon it. The vote yielded in favour of abandoning it.


They requested to have more Ratepayer meetings, and to have more information on the Councillor's representing their areas. Mr. Ewart suggested quarterly meetings, with questions brought forth to the Reeve prior to the meetings so he would be better prepared to address citizen's concerns.

Some Ratepayers suggested to the Reeve transparency was vital. The Reeve, who was the voice for the RM Council, received a room full of Ratepayers who had some tough questions and committed to provide an answer to anyone who wanted to submit a question within seven days.

#### **MAYOR- PER VINDING**

Hello again,

It sure is nice to see the white stuff

again. I was starting to think that we were not getting any more snow until next winter. Even my dog likes it.... But enough about that.....

We are working on Council see Town growth. We want to see folks move into Town and set up business. For years Council has wondered whether to get businesses into Town and then hope the population grows, or do we get the population to grow and then hopefully businesses will come and set up shop. My thought is the latter. Get people here and the businesses will follow. We also need our population to grow to increase our tax base. Theoretically, the larger the tax base the lower the cost to individuals. The Sunshine Meadows development will attract people. Council has put into place some tax incentives to attract new residents.

We are in the process of annexing land across the highway for highway commercial.

Hopefully this will spur Town growth as well. The land owners have requested that the land become part of the Town. We sent the request to the RM and they have agreed to proceed with this process. With this annexation we will be approaching the Dept. of Highways to look at putting in proper acceleration and deceleration lanes on the highway going north and south. When the population grows that intersection will need to see some improvement.

As Reeve Reid mentioned at the RM AGM, the Dundurn and Area Waste Water Utility is in the process of transferring to each Municipality the assets that pertain to each municipality. The Town has advocated for this for some time. We will be looking after our lift station and the force main from our lift station to the lagoon. The Saskpower and SaskTel accounts have already been transferred to the Town. The Utility will be dealing with the lagoon only. With these changes to the Utility we are looking at

purchasing extra lagoon capacity from the RM. This will allow us to have ample lagoon capacity for future growth.

Council has requested that the force main portion of the Tangible Capital Assets Reserve that the town contributed be returned to the Town when the transfer process is completed. This will give us a good start to having funds in place for future repairs to our lift station and force main.

For the past number of years, the Town has contributed approximately 40% of the user fees to the Utility and has contributed to the repairs in other Municipalities. The Town has requested that the Utility refund this overpayment.

The cost associated with the truck dump repairs at Shields was not paid for according to the operating agreement, so the Town has requested that this be rectified. Council feels that Town should not pay 40% of the cost for something that is in another Municipality.




## OFF TO AN EARLY START

Happy New Year!

I'm encouraged by new statistics that show Saskatchewan exporters are

leading the nation. Our wholesale trade grew 21 per cent last year, the best in Canada. And thanks to our outstanding entrepreneurs, our wholesale trade is up more than 75% over the past 10 years.

The new year brings new incentives for small businesses to hire more workers and invest new capital here in Saskatchewan. Effective January 1, the amount of income up to which small businesses pay tax at the much lower two per cent small business tax rate moved from \$500,000 to \$600,000.

Meanwhile, Saskatchewan's 12 per cent corporate income tax rate continues to be competitive and among the lowest in the country, further enhancing our province's significant ad-

vantages when attracting new investment and jobs.

Also in 2018, Saskatchewan residents will benefit for an entire calendar year from lower provincial Personal Income Tax rates, which dropped half a percentage point effective July 1, 2017. Saskatchewan Personal Income Tax rates will drop by another half point on July 1, 2019.

A bitterly cold holiday season, and continuing cold weather, have many of us looking forward to warmer days. Here in Saskatchewan, many of those days are spent visiting our Provincial Parks.

Seasonal camping – which is offered at a discount from the regular nightly camping – provides an opportunity to secure a campsite from mid-May to the end of August, and even into September at some locations. Due to its popularity, sites are allocated via a lottery system.


You can visit www.saskparks.net to

apply for a seasonal site by Thursday, February 1, 2018. The draw to award campsites taking place on Monday, February 5, 2018.

Those who are interested in making nightly reservations can do so starting Monday, April 9. As has been the process for several years, now, nightly campsite reservations will be staggered with a registration launch taking place over 12 days.

During a decade of growth, the Government of Saskatchewan invested more than \$100 million in upgrades and improvements to provincial park infrastructure.

Projects undertaken include the development of two new campgrounds, upgrading or replacement of service centers, extensive campsite electrical expansion and upgrading, water and wastewater system upgrades, new and enhanced boat launches and new campsite furnishings.



#### TOWN POSITIONS ITSELF FOR MORE GROWTH

At the regular meeting of council on January 8, the public hearing for the proposed annexation of 47 acres SE of Hwy 11 and Hwy 211 opened to anyone that wanted more information or to file an objection to the proposal.

The proposed annexation was requested by the owners of the land, who also are the developers of Sunshine Meadows, a 90-acre development of mixed residential and commercial retail on the SW side of Hwy 11 in the town.

Town Administrator, Eileen Prosser explained the land owners approached the town in May of 2016 to annex two parcels, the current proposed 47 acres and another 147 acres south contiguous to the current Sunshine Meadows development which they own as well. At the time the RM declined to approve the annexation. Later on, the land owners revised their request to only the 47 acres, as they had more immediate interest from potential commercial industrial businesses for the parcel.

The Town consulted with Planner Jim

Walters from Crosby Hanna & Assoc., who also prepared the town's Future Growth Study, and a new request for annexation was sent to the RM in which they approved December 20.

The hearing was attended by all of Council, Town Planners Jim Walters, Gale Hagblom and a town citizen, who had concerns regarding traffic issues at the entrance to Dundurn if more development were to take place in addition to the 90-acre residential and commercial. He explained the highway has become busier over the years and at certain times of the day, it's very dangerous leaving town going North with all the traffic. He also questioned why the owners wanted the land within the town boundaries and why it couldn't be left in the RM. He asked if it was due to wanting the town to finance the water and sewer infrastructure required to service the land.

Administrator Eileen Prosser explained that a Traffic Impact Study (TIA) was requested by Ministry of Highways and Infrastructure (MHI) for the current Sunshine Meadows development and they are aware of the suggestions in the report. The developers are also required to reconstruct, in financial partnership with MHI; the acceleration lane going north towards Saskatoon in Phase 2 of the

development. As for the town financing infrastructure costs in a new development, "it did not happen at Sunshine Meadows and would not happen in any future development," explained Prosser. "Developers pay for the cost of their development. Not only do they pay for all costs within the development, in fact the town receives an additional off-site lot levy from the developer every time a lot is sold. This is the norm for new development and the Town's standard going forward". The storm sewer and water line constructed from the lift station to Sunshine Meadows property line was the towns responsibility to cover, however all costs were paid upfront by the developers and the town's agreement is to pay it back interest free through a portion of the offsite lot levy's as they are collected. The concerned citizen hoped that Council would be pro-active to resolving the traffic safety issues at the entrance and work with MHI and the RM of Dundurn before it becomes an unbearable situation instead of waiting until it is. The next step after the public hearing is to complete an Application and Proposal

The next step after the public hearing is to complete an Application and Proposal Form and send along with the minutes of the public meeting and any other submissions received, to Community Planning for a decision on the requested approval.



"God keep our land glorious and free."


