JOIN RM OF DUNDURN COUNCIL

On Wednesday, October 24th, RM of Dundurn ratepayers in divisions 2, 4 and 5 headed to the polling stations to elect their next municipal government representatives. The results - two newly elected members - Andy Olson representing Division 2 and Fred Scott in Division 5, will be joining the RM's council. Fred Baran was re-elected in Division 4.

Olson and Scott have some time to digest the news before the swearingin ceremony on November 5th at 9:00 am, followed by a new council orientation session and a special meeting with the other council members. November 6th will be their first regular RM council meeting, which was moved to an earlier date due to the Fall Convention being held Nov 13 - 15th in Saskatoon.

A little background on the two new representatives: Fred Scott is employed at Mosiac Potash mine as a surface production coordinator and doesn't forecast any issues attending council meetings, as his

job allows him to work remotely from time to time. His mandate "is to represent everyone in Division 5 from the farmers who have been here for generations to the new acreage owners," Scott stated. He has no hidden agenda, he only wants the RM to grow at a good pace and ensure grid roads are built as they should be. Scott is no stranger to RM life, he grew up near Watrous, SK and looks forward to working with all the other divisions reps and the Reeve.

Andy Olson, a long time resident of the Dundurn

area, grew up in the town of Dundurn before moving onto a small ranch in 1989.

Andy's mandate simply is to represent the ratepayers in his division, but would like to ensure transparency for all the ratepayers in all divisions.

### DOES RURAL CRIME GET THE ATTENTION IT DESERVES? By Glenda Pryor

Rural and small town crime seems to be on everyone's radar these days, and the RCMP are working towards partnership with communities by making the public more aware of prevention by holding town hall meetings, as the one held at Dundurn's Community Hall on October 11<sup>th</sup>, 2018.

During the presentation, Staff Sgt. Kevin Williamson explained one of the handicaps the RCMP is faced with — the shortage of members in our community. There are 17 members belonging to the Saskatoon Detachment that patrol Blucher, RM of Blucher, Clavet, Corman Park, Dundurn and Sunset Estates. Two members are stationed to each of their satellite detachments located in Colonsay, Hanley, Whitecap First Nations and Vonda.

The RCMP have four initiatives: Prolific offenders, drugs, organized crime and property crime. Because the RCMP can't be everywhere they are asking community members to report what is going on in your area by calling 310-RCMP (310-7267) and/ or contact John Barry, rural crime watch leader or Jodi Beamish the town rep. at crimewatch314@gmail.com. The Rural Crime Watch program is not police driven, but is community driven which the RCMP support

The RCMP base the need for patrolling through stats and request that all incidents (small and large) be called in. Although your call may not be dealt with immediately, dependent on where the patrol car is, the information will be complied for them to accurately detect problem areas in order to patrol the area in question more effectively. "It's about being in the right place at the right time to stop the crime before it happens." Williamson stated "as each area is different when it comes to crime."

During the forum, Williamson answered the gallery's concerns and questions. One question that resonated through the group was how much force one could use when protecting their property. As each circumstance is different, Williamson suggested to stay in your house to be safe.

There is one option the community could undertake. Williamson spoke of an enhanced program that is available to communities at the cost of \$140,000.00 per year. This would mean an established RCMP member would be provided with all the equipment to stay within that community. The benefit - there would be a constant presence of RCMP in our area, the downside - the cost.

Town Mayor Per Vinding and Councillor Annette Hamilton who attended the information night, said that council did briefly discuss a community officer at their October meeting. The \$140,000 per year cost would be in addition to the current levy for policing which is \$28,000. \$168,000 for a town with a total tax base of \$550,000 would not be possible at this time without a further tax levy or a cost share with several other communities.

#### COMFORT FOOD BRINGS COMMUNITY TOGETHER By

Harvest time on the prairies means that one of the oldest culinary traditions comes to life: the Fall Supper. From mid-October to early November, rural community halls open their doors and offer buffet style home cooking, served with a side of hospitality.

Dundurn's 2018 fall supper, spearheaded by Melva Richmond, was held on October 28th. The event caters to individuals, who walked through the door to enjoy the autumn feast. Although numbers have dropped over the last few years, for several reasons such as weather and other fall suppers on the same day, the event still draws out many from the city and other communities that have been attending for years.

Since 2016 a Fall Supper Committee has planned the event and maintained the same traditions as the Dundurn United Church who put on the supper for decades up until 2015. "I felt we couldn't let the Fall Supper tradition in Dundurn end without at least trying to continue on and keeping it the same. People know what to expect when they take the time to travel out here to it, once you change it, you lose your followers," explained

co-ordinator Melva Richmond. Difficulty finding volunteers and donations is why a lot of communities no longer have them, and Dundurn is feeling the pinch.

Preparations for the harvest feast start a month before lining up volunteers to cook hams and turkeys, make dressing, and pie donations. The Clear Spring Colony participated by supplying and cooking the turnips, potatoes, and carrots for this event.

The Culture Club run the dining room and kitchen during the dinner and help with clean-up which is an intricate part in the whole event. "We simply could not do it anymore either without the help of the Culture Club and all the wonderful volunteers who help us cook the hams, turkey's and make pies," said Richmond.

"This year a total of 415 attended and I was a little disappointed as I was looking forward to a least 500," said committee member Eileen Prosser, "but after speaking with Patty Sawchuk, a long time Fall Supper volunteer, she mentioned that any attendance over 400 is doing good."

Richmond added that, "the main thing is to cover our costs and if we make a profit to donate to various causes, then that's a plus. For me, it's more about community gathering and keeping local traditions for as long as we can."

Report from the Legislature

A follower of Christ will be a player in life. They will have a high view of their neighbor (the widow and the orphan), and a high view of God ("keep oneself unspotted from the world").

I believe, in true religion, God has come to us in the Person of Jesus Christ and a Christ-like response for me is to be engaged in my world in healing and helping ways. Faith, hope and love are the key ingredients in doing this. Without faith it is impossible

to please God, the Bible tells us in Hebrews 11:6. Through faith I become dependent on God. Independence is a killer. And yet we often spiritualize our self-sufficiency, regaling in our health, retreating behind our savings for retirement, or refusing to associate with someone 'not of my kind,' thinking all will be well with us and we can cheat death.

Faith is the quality necessary to succeed in life from God's perspective. And hope is an integral part of the equation (Hebrews 11:1). Rather than superficially dealing with a person's circumstance or situation, hope provides a hug and a heart to the one who is sick, hurt, lonely or perishing. When there are no immediate answers, hope sourced in Jesus Christ provides the assurance one can live on

for better times are ahead if only – but certainly - in eternity to come.

Romans 5:5 informs us this kind of "hope does not disappoint." A short conversation, a simple prayer, or an act of kindness can be enough to instill hope in the heart of another. And love calls us beyond the dysfunctional paralysis and pettiness of envy. rudeness, pride and keeping a record of wrongs. Love calls us higher.

If we are not adding value in life, we are just adding noise. I cannot be a "talking head" only; I must be a "beating heart" for love is an action word. "And now abide faith, hope, love, these three: but the greatest of these is love" (1 Corinthians 13:13).
