hard to score during November 17 home game. Although it was a close one up to the end of the second period, the final score of the game was 5-2 for Kelvington.




SPIRIT OF CHRISTMAS



TOWN OF DUNDURN RECEIVES FEDERAL FUNDING

The Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) and the Government of Canada are announcing more than \$4.5 million for 109 initiatives across the country through three programs: the Municipal Asset Management Program (MAMP), the Municipalities for Climate Innovation Program (MCIP) and the Green Municipal Fund (GMF).

The Town of Dundurn is receiving \$28,832.00 dollars for an asset management group learning initiative, delivered through FCM's federally-funded Municipal Asset Management Program (MAMP).

Aging infrastructure, including roads,

buildings and bridges, competing priorities, limited budgets. These are some of the challenges municipalities face in making infrastructure decisions today. FCM's new Municipal Asset Management Program is a five-year, \$50 -million program designed to help Canadian municipalities make informed infrastructure investment decisions based on sound asset management practices. The program is funded by the Government of Canada and the reporting will be a requirement before receiving the yearly Federal Gas Tax Funding grant.

Note: An advance notice to all community bingo players and public that starting in January, 2019, BINGO Nights will be held on the last Monday of the month in the Museum.


The museum will be undergoing a number of changes in displays and configuration over the winter months and it is hoped that when the museum opens on the May Long weekend will bring many visitors in 2019.

It's that time of year again when we need to offer a reminder about a few division policies regarding cold weather because we've had a taste of it already, and I think it's a safe bet that more of it's

on its way before we see spring.

Remind your students to wear the proper warm clothes to school again this season for any of our students being picked up by bus. Bus Drivers do have the authority to refuse students entry to the bus if they don't have proper clothing for cold weather. In the case of a breakdown, all students should have proper clothing to ensure they are safe and warm on the bus while waiting for sup-port to arrive.

While on the topic of bussing – a reminder that a combined temperature and wind chill that drops to minus 40 degrees will cancel buses for the day. If a bus doesn't run in the morning, it will not run in the afternoon. Classes will never be cancelled on those days – the school is required to remain open for those students who do make it to school, including those whose parents drive them in. The grade 11 and 12 students enjoyed another morning earlier this month at the annual Career Fair in Saskatoon. Planning should be well underway for students to narrow their options for careers or education following grade 12. For those students who are still struggling with ideas, help is always available from Mr. Tucker who can lead the students to directions to start looking for answers. I'll also encourage any students who are considering an apprenticeship opportunity to spend some time to complete the Youth Apprenticeship Program this year as it offers many benefits to the student and the employer.

Report from the Legislature

The Saskatchewan Party government

continues to invest in important infrastructure projects such as highways, schools, and hospitals in every part of Saskatchewan.

This week, we opened new passing lanes to improve safety on Highway 4. This is in addition to ongoing and completed work all across the province. Earlier this fall, the Chief Mistawasis Bridge in north Saskatoon was opened to traffic. New interchanges at Warman and Martensville, two of the fastest-growing communities in Saskatchewan, will also open this fall, one year ahead of schedule.

The Regina Bypass, which offers a long-term safety solution for Regina and the surrounding area, will be completed next October, on time and on budget. In all, more than 13,000 kilometres of Saskatchewan highways have been built or improved and 275 bridges have been repaired or replaced since 2007. These projects reduce congestion, improve traffic safety and support future growth.

Meanwhile, our commitment to modernizing healthcare infrastructure has resulted in an investment of approximately \$1.5 billion. This includes the completion of two new hospitals, 14 long-term care facilities, and ongoing capital for the construction of two additional hospitals.

We are now nearing completion of the new provincial psychiatric hospital in North Battleford. The facility will be among the most innovative mental health treatment centres in the country and ensure that those facing significant mental health needs receive the best treatment available. Through a phased -in approach, 188 mental health beds

will be available to deliver mental health care and support, and an adjoining correctional facility will provide 96 beds for offenders living with mental health challenges.

Also this year, SaskTel expanded its High-Speed Fusion Internet to 35 additional rural locations in the province, completing Phase One of our government's plan to provide communities with enhanced access to high-speed internet services.

As part of Phase Two of this plan, SaskTel is working to improve 4G LTE cellular services in 100 rural Saskatchewan communities through the deployment of a small cell site solution, with the first 50 communities expected to be complete in the spring.

No Ordinary Child

When my wife and I first discovered that she was pregnant with our first child, it surprised us. Nothing like this had ever happened to us before. We just, you know, loved each other, and that was fine. Now it took on a new meaning. Life and love were going into a new phase, in its own direction, and we were being taken along with it!

What surprised us too, was that it was no longer just the two of us. Someone, clearly "someone," was kicking around inside my wife, pushing the world around her out and making her presence known. She was making room; into the world, into our lives, into her own mind, body, and being.

On the day she arrived, my wife was relieved (tired, but ok) and rightly proud. For me, I cried. My life would never be the same. Ever. I adored her. Unashamedly. A new kind of love was born for me that day. Surprised, I was, at how much she changed me, right from her first breath. We called her; "Emily Jane." Musical, it sounded. For Christians, when we read the story of the birth of Jesus in Luke chapter two, we are meant to think of births in general. It was Mary's first-born, the text says. It says, there was "no room for them in the Inn." Some put the emphasis on the "no room." Others suggest that the emphasis should be put on the, "for them." Why the difference? Because Mary was not, shall we say, pregnant according to the normal way things like this occur. And, an Inn was not a business, as they are now. It was a room at a relative's house. They didn't like what they knew about, "them."

When we read the story of the birth of Jesus, we are also meant to see that this was no ordinary birth. About 745 years before, its location was predicted. So was the star that guided the wise men there. So was his name. Shepherds arrived and said that a chorus of angels had told them to "go see this child" that was, "born in an animal's manger."

Joseph and Mary could not have prepared themselves for this. Clearly, this was no ordinary child. He would not only make room for himself inside her womb, and then in a nation, and then in an empire, but as is clear even in our day, in the whole world. As one author wrote in a book I read a few years ago, "There is not a person alive today who has not positively benefitted from the Child who was born in a stable."

For Christians, this birth changed everything. Everything about heaven and earth, us and God, truth and fiction, and the very meaning of life. A new kind of love was born that day. We are not surprised angels appeared in the night-time sky, singing. We are not surprised lavish gifts were given him by Wise Men. We are not surprised shepherds, "went and told everyone about this child." They called him, "Immanuel." God with us.

Now, 36 years later, our little girl is a woman with children of her own! Amazing to us; not only at how fast time goes by, but that our infant-love could grow and mature.

"The Naked Truth of Christmas"

If you have had an occasion of having to put on and wear a hospital gown, maybe you share the sentiment that it can be a most un-settling experience – and drafty one too! It is as naked as I want to appear in a public place. Nakedness is for private times and intimate moments.

Yet at this season of the year, with our penchant for lights, decorations, and gifts to make it merry, we can forget and miss the truth that Christmas is God coming naked into the world. *"And she brought forth her firstborn Son, and wrapped Him in swaddling cloths, and laid Him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn."* (Luke 2:7 NKJV) I offer three reasons why I believe this is so.

"It matters to Him about you," is a line from an old hymn that captures the embrace and experience God wants you and me to know about Him. God loves and cares very deeply about us.

Thirdly, God coming naked into our world - fully God and fully Man meant He would have to die. Yet His was no ordinary death. As the sinless One. Jesus Christ died for our sin. The manger provides a framework but not a finished work for what God had planned. Christmas needs the cross and the resurrection to be completely understood. Through Jesus Christ's coming, dying and rising again, we can have confidence and hope to take us through life's entire journey on earth. 


